Colleen leads several initiatives including Project SEARCH and Working Partners, a public/private partnership with the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission focused on increasing employment of people with disabilities in healthcare. She holds Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Boston College and lives in Reading.

Richard Curtis has championed the development of numerous staffing initiatives through his relationship building, pipeline development, and strategic creativity in Massachusetts for over 20 years. In his most recent role as Vice President of Workforce

Development at State Street Corporation, he managed over a dozen of State Street's workforce programs in the Boston area, including partnering with many disability organizations. In 2019, Richard received several awards in recognition of his work: the Francis X. McCarthy Diversity Inclusion Champion Award from Northeast Human Resources Association (NEHRA); MA State Senate and House Citation for Dedicated Service and Commitment for his partnership with the Mass. Commission for the Blind's summer intern program; and The Partnership Award from Work Without Limits, which is given annually to a professional leader who exemplifies the spirit of collaboration in advancing the employment of people with disabilities in Massachusetts. Richard also serves as a Director of the Board at the Carroll Center for the Blind and is a contributor on the advisory boards of the Private Industry Council and Work Without Limits, along with his membership on the Perkins Corporator Group and Massachusetts Advocacy for Children's B-Set Committee. Richard is a native New Englander residing in his childhood home in Marblehead with his wife, Amy.
